Annie:	Welcome back to That Sounds Fun, Edward.
Eddie:	Annie F. Downs.
Annie:	What a treat.
Eddie:	Good to see you.
Annie:	Listen, medical let's do the old ambulance update, as we like to call it, the old medical update. You led with, "I'm out of a boot today," and I said, "Didn't know one was in a boot."
Eddie:	Buddy, I have been in a boot for like two months.
Annie:	Which leg?
Eddie:	Left foot. Have you ever had a foot injury?
Annie:	Yes, it's brutal. It affects everything.
Eddie:	Brutal. And this boot has been all the way up, up to my calf.
Annie:	No!

Eddie:	Oh, yeah.
Annie:	Okay, how did you rip your tendon?
Eddie:	Crazy story. It's a Thursday morning, I'm standing at the window, drinking a cup of coffee, watching the trash guys. And I had left a big box out and I wanted to see, maybe they're gonna take it. And then my tendon disconnected.
Annie:	While you were standing there?
Eddie:	Literally just standing there, and all of a sudden I'm like, ah! And it was like, uh-oh! So then I just waited and waited, and Brianne was finally like, "You've got to go to a podiatrist."
Annie:	Were you kind of hobbling?
Eddie:	Not kind of.
Annie:	You were hobbling as a person.
Eddie:	Like hobbling. Hobbling. And I went, and so yeah, a boot, and all of that. But I'm gonna be in a wedding in a couple weeks. I didn't wanna be in a boot. I just feel like the world is my oyster again. So that's your medical update. How are you medically?
Annie:	Did there have to be a surgical return?
Eddie:	There did. There was not a full surgery, but it was-
Annie:	Wait, you have not told us any of this. You had a surgery over Christmas, when your basement was flooding?
Eddie:	Yeah. Yeah, it was all happening at the same time. It was messy.
Annie:	Eddy.
Eddie:	Listen, I'm going to be gentle about what the procedure was, but here's what it was. So the tendon disconnects, and they don't normally go and reconnect it unless you're planning on playing in the NBA. But when you're a podcaster-
Annie:	Which, it's still on your dream board that I saw, no?

Eddie:	Still on it, yeah. But they go in and there's not a lot of blood flow to that area, so they take some blood from somewhere else and they put it in there with a big needle. And I'm telling you, I blacked out during the procedure.
Annie:	Wait, they didn't knock you out? That feels like a knock-me-out if you're taking blood from here and putting it there.
Eddie:	No, they didn't. And I'm telling you, it was 12 of 10. I will never experience anything like that in my life.
Annie:	Were you laying face down? I'm picturing face down, heel, back of your foot, wide open to the doctor, and he's just right there.
Eddie:	I am on my back and it's an assistant holding my leg because they're doing needle in the bottom of your foot. Like you're a little ticklish and a little painful. So they're holding on tight. And I'm telling you, I lit up that office. They are Mormon, which is great, for them. But they have books of Mormon to give away in multiple languages out in the lobby. And I'm pretty sure they've heard words that have not been approved at Brigham Young Pediatric School.
Annie:	Brigham Young Pediatric School. Wow. So then two-plus months of being in a boot, but today free, just freewheeling out there.
Eddie:	Oh man. Feeling great. Just took a walk around the neighborhood.
Annie:	Two shoes.
Eddie:	Finally, finally.
Annie:	Does it feel better?
Eddie:	Oh, it feels amazing. I feel 100%. So I'm like signing up for 5K.
Annie:	Oh, are you?
Eddie:	I mean, you know this feeling like you gotta get your body back. You've known that feeling.
Annie:	It takes time, yeah.
Eddie:	It does, but you gotta anyhow, it's good to be back.
Annie:	Oh, bless you.

Eddie: Annie, talk to me.

- Annie: My medical update. Thanks for asking. You did ask. I hurt my back... Well, let me back you all the way up. Remember I had a cyst in August.
- Eddie: I do, yeah.

Annie: The cyst's growth changed the shape of my spine.

Eddie: Oh.

- **Annie:** It moved my spine.
- **Eddie:** That seems like a real positive thing. Generally.
- Annie: It's been cute. It's been a cute experience since October of '22. This has been a part of my life. So-
- **Eddie:** Your spine, huh?
- Annie: So, as it grew, it moved all the organs out of the way, which we knew, but it also seems to have shifted the shape of my spine.
- Eddie: But the organs, that little spaghetti factory just sloshes back in place, right?
- Annie: That's exactly right. I was seasick for three days after my surgery because everything-
- Eddie: Really?
- Annie: Oh, I was seasick the whole time because all my organs were going back from whence they came. Now, pregnant women, after they have a baby and their cyst is removed, which is a person, they have all these hormones that say, organs go back, organs go back. So they do it, and you have all this other stuff going on. But I didn't have those hormones, I just had an empty cavity. So everybody sloshed back from whence they came. And in the meantime, the shape of my spine had changed.
- **Eddie:** And the spine just doesn't tick back, huh?
- Annie: No, not as well. So I've been seeing a chiropractor, which has been really helpful. But I need to tell you they gave me a new thing to do yesterday and I was dead in

the water excited to tell you about this because you're going to love what I have to do. This is a stretch for...

The pain for me is my lower left back wrapping around my leg and down my thigh to my knee on the left side. So from your back, imagine, in Taylor Swift's outfit, the one she does during Reputation, how the snake wraps around her leg, it is that. Follow the snake, follow the snake, and that's where I'm in pain. And particularly when I'm sitting, because that's where the nerves... so nerves are pinched, is the thing, from the shape of my spine. We're getting it all right and ready, and it's going to be fine in, I'm sure, 15 to 30 years.

So, they give me this new exercise yesterday, and they say, roll up a towel... Now, before I say this, will you do our legal disclaimer about how we're not medical professionals?

- **Eddie:** You 100% should follow our advice. We are medical professionals. All of this should be considered as-
- Annie: Everything we say we do, do.

Eddie: This is a HIPAA compliant show. We are your doctors. So go for it.

Annie: We are MDs, for sure. Meaning we have microphones. So I'm not telling anyone else to do this. This is particularly for my blah, blah, blah. Roll up a towel, place it on the ground. Lay your belly button over it. So that's where you're supposed to lay because there is a muscle that is really deep in your belly that connects to your legs.

- Eddie: Wow.
- Annie: So the first time I was like, they need someone with less belly if this is gonna make a difference, because this doesn't work. By minute two and a half, it felt like I was stretching a muscle I've never known existed.

Eddie: What in the world?

Annie: And by minute four, I was hurting. And you're supposed to stay and keep breathing and breathe through the pain and whatever. And then this morning I woke up and I feel like I did an ab workout. And all I did was lay on the towel.

Eddie: Annie, isn't the body so weird?

Annie: Can't understand it. It's not understandable.

Eddie:	Nobody has ever understood it.
Annie:	No one has ever understood anything about the body.
Eddie:	Right. We can go to the ends of the earth, we can explore Mars, but we are not going to know why that towel works.
Annie:	Thank you. Your hot take on chiropractors.
Eddie:	I don't remember it. I don't remember anything I've ever said.
Annie:	No, no, no. I'm asking if you have one. I'm asking for a freshie.
Eddie:	Oh, oh, i've never been to one. I don't
Annie:	Oh, that surprises me.
Eddie:	Yeah, no. It feels like I should. Hot take on chiropractors, I would say, I don't know the difference between that and a massage therapist, and I don't know if they know the difference. Though I believe there's a lot of schooling, and it's because I am ignorant. But I think it's all
Annie:	The money is the same, the difference is 60 minutes versus five, sadly.
Eddie:	Great. So, the chiropractor is 60?
Annie:	You wish. A massage is a 60-minute massage. And they snap-crackle pop you for five, and you have paid the same.
Eddie:	God, you know there's a chiropractor for dogs.
Annie:	The thing I love about this one What?
Eddie:	Hold on, I need you to finish because I will never come back if we don't, so you go.
Annie:	They take x-rays, so there's a lot of science.
Eddie:	X-rays.
Annie:	Versus like, I can feel that your back is straighter, I'm like, nah, you don't know, my guy. But these people, there's a machine that takes a picture and then takes another picture and then takes another picture and goes, look, your spine is correcting.

Eddie:	So that's the difference between a chiropractor and a massage therapist.
Annie:	No, no, no. That's just the difference between this particular chiropractor and my previous chiropractor experiences of like, "Yeah, keep coming back. We're not sure." And these people are like, "We're so sure we're going to take pictures."
Eddie:	And he said the difference is 55 minutes and an x-ray.
Annie:	Yeah. That's it. That's the only difference. So again-
Eddie:	And \$200,000 of school loans.
Annie:	Take that medical professional information straight from us. Dog chiropractors? I cannot with that.
Eddie:	I know. But have you seen There's like this guy that will like be holding this dog and just go click. Oops, sorry, my little phone went off.
Annie:	What a neat sound though.
Eddie:	Click. And the dog just jumps to attention and is all of a sudden feeling great. And I just can't believe it.
Annie:	I think you would really enjoy it. It's amazing.
Eddie:	I'm sure I would.
Annie:	Do you like cracking your knuckles?
Eddie:	No because-
Annie:	Imagine that down your whole back. We're going to get so many emails from chiropractors.
Eddie:	It's ignorance, just so you know. I don't know.
Annie:	But I believe in it. I'm ignorant and full of belief. I'm having the best time. They're so nice. My back is feeling better every time I go.
Eddie:	Right. Do you think most of chiropractor school is like, listen, you're going to want to have them lay on a towel? That's-
Annie:	Put a towel across their belly, it will change their life.

Eddie:	And you have no idea how they got the dreaded reputation pain, just put them on a towel.
Annie:	Next question. When you lay down on the floor of your house, where do you lay down?
Eddie:	Do you mean like floor area or body area?
Annie:	Good question. Where on the floor? What floor of your house do you choose to lay any part of your body on? If someone said, do this exercise.
Eddie:	Oh, do this exercise?
Annie:	Yeah.
Eddie:	Okay, we have a mud room that has a mat on it for this exact purpose.
Annie:	So you don't lay the towel down and lay it on the mat.
Eddie:	Yeah. I don't think I've laid on another part of our house ever. Where do you lay on the floor?
Annie:	This is my soft leadership because I'm about to tell you I have a mat and I have a room where I work out. And for some unbeknownst to me reason, I decided last night I think because my phone was in my bathroom on the sink, I decided to lay half in the doorway to my bedroom and half in the doorway to my bathroom. Like I was laying over the door threshold between my bedroom and my bathroom.
Eddie:	I've seen murder scenes in movies. I know what that looks like.
Annie:	That is exactly what I did. Someone walking in my front door would have for sure thought I'd been murdered because my feet were out into my bedroom. My head was toward the sink because that's where my phone was and I pulled my phone down and I was playing, which, let me tell you, I am hot on the game right now of Block Blast, which is a version of Tetris.
Eddie:	Yeah, okay. But hold on. Why did you choose to lay between two rooms? Because that seems like the worst place because there's a threshold. Does the tile continue there?
Annie:	No, it's a little bit of carpet. So I was on carpet the whole way because I was in the sink part of the bathroom, not the shower tub part of the bathroom. So it's a little bit

of a doorway. Yeah, I know. When I was doing it, I was like... I looked at something that I've never cleaned before because I've never been on the ground there. And I was like, "That is disgusting. I should get a brush down here and scrub this."

- Eddie: Oh, yeah. That is gross.
- Annie: It's so gross. The whole thing was the weirdest. Also it was a weird time. It was 8.45. And I was like, "What am I doing?"
- **Eddie:** I'm surprised you didn't just turn on like a Netflix or something.
- Annie: Right, and play in the living room. Well, to be fair, I had to do another stretch. I have a whole collection I get to do. And I did those in the living room. And then when I went to the bathroom, I remember I did the towel one, I got a towel and suddenly I was like, "Oh, I should do it right here." And I was like-
- Eddie: Down we go.
- Annie: "Who are you? Who are you?"
- **Eddie:** Oh my gosh. Our floors are... not our floors. Like the Cobbled floors. But generally I think people's floors are gross. It's when you have little kids down there a lot, you notice it. But as the kids get bigger, you just move away from that area. I mean,-
- Annie: There are some of our friends who refuse to be barefoot in a hotel.
- **Eddie:** Oh, yeah. I mean, Jason Bateman, not our friend, but he talks about it all the time on "SmartLess".
- Annie: I wish.
- Eddie: Oh, no kidding.
- Annie: Can we be friends? What will it take? What do we have to do? I think I have to vote in his way to be his friend.
- **Eddie:** I mean, I think you're our... I mean, our everybody listening, you're our best hope. So I feel like if you just keep trying and keep working, I feel like if the Annie F. Downs show comes to fruition or whatever the next book is, like...
- Annie: Television show, you mean?

Eddie:	Yeah.
Annie:	I don't know that they're ever gonna have me on "SmartLess." But there's got to be a way. Who do we know that knows him? There has to be an in-betweener.
Eddie:	Well, I would say your closest connection, it seems, is Broadway. Because you've got all the Broadway people. Sean does a lot on Broadway. He just finished <i>Good Night, Oscar.</i> So it feels like that's the most everything else is tenuous. Though, Jason Bateman is about to be in New York for a long time shooting a movie.
Annie:	Oh my gosh, you are exactly right. I heard him say it. Did you hear him say it on What'd you listen to? Armchair?
Eddie:	Yes.
Annie:	Yeah. I heard him on Armchair. I don't listen to it anymore except I wanted to hear Jason Bateman because he's our future friend.
Eddie:	I'm hit and miss with that show, but when there's a guest I really like, I will be there. It was interesting hearing them talk to each other. It was like when the Harlem Globetrotters were on Scooby-Doo. Just like combining my favorite things.
Annie:	I loved it.
Eddie:	It's interesting you bring that up because for some reason, when I last updated my phone, when I did an Apple update, it erased my entire bank of podcasts. It erased what I subscribed to, it erased episodes I had saved, it erased everything.
Eddie:	Really?
Annie:	Yes.
Eddie:	That's a bummer.
Annie:	It is a huge bummer. And it also is like, is that happening to people all the time and we're losing subscribers across all of our shows and we just don't even know because Apple reset people's I tried to google it and read about it. I called our big time pro over at the network Tarik, and I was like, are you hearing about any of this? And I mean-
Eddie:	Oh, man. I would hate that. There are so many shows that I'm just waiting for it to come back. Hoping. And I just keep subscribed to the feed.

Annie:	Same. And it's all gone. I've been trying to be an Apple person. I think I'm gonna go back to Spotify, because all that had remained at Spotify just about. That is how I got exposed to Jason Bateman being on Armchair, because they advertised it. So I was like, oh. Because I don't even think I subscribe to Armchair anymore.
Eddie:	Did something happen? Or was it just you fell out of your favor?
Annie:	Yeah. It just stopped I mean, I think this is the nature sometimes of podcasts is if they are still doing the same thing on that show. I just didn't enjoy it as much as I used to. And they're long.
Eddie:	Oh, yeah. Totally.
Annie:	I'm a little that way with "SmartLess". At this point, I'm still subscribed, but I am not listening to everything. I'm listening to the guests I like.
Eddie:	I'll definitely do that.
Annie:	You? Are you listening to everything?
Eddie:	No. No, I'll move around. But I do that with books, too. Don't you get in like a Like, right now I gotta read a big, chunky history book. That feels right. I can already tell the next one's not gonna be that. I don't know what it's gonna be, but, you know, you kinda get in that. And that's the same with podcasts, and that's fine.
Annie:	I am jonesing for a new series to binge on podcasting.
Eddie:	Oh, like a hearken to like a serial S-Town kind of thing?
Annie:	Yes. I don't want like, hey Annie, have you tried this crime podcast? I want us all to do it again. I'm jonesing for one that we all can't quit.
Eddie:	Well, I'm jonesing still for our unnamed show that we cannot ever talk about, that we have not made yet, that we hope to make someday.
Annie:	I know.
Eddie:	That I still, someday. You guys can cross your fingers for a thing you've never heard of us.
Annie:	We have a series. You mean the one involving another person, not the one you and I did.

Eddie:	No, yeah. That thing.
Annie:	Guess what, everybody? Eddie and I did an entire season of a show that got totally trashed.
Eddie:	You got to.
Annie:	It retired. We hung it up. But then there's another show we want to make with another friend that-
Eddie:	We'll get it. We'll get it
Annie:	That culture would be about.
Eddie:	That's right. Yes.
Annie:	But what I would give for another Serial or another What else did that? Serial did that. What's the one about the murder in Georgia?
Eddie:	Oh, S-Town?
Annie:	Up and Vanished.
Eddie:	Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah.
Annie:	S-Town? S-Town. That's what we need. We need S-Town. The turn at the end of S-Town?
Eddie:	Oh, the one about Dolly Parton?
Annie:	Was that 2015? This is an episode about 2015. I feel like the one about Dolly Parton, the one about Richard Simmons.
Eddie:	Yes. Oh, Richard Simmons is the one I want to land on. That was, to me, perfect. It wasn't too scary. It was pop-cultury.
Annie:	It told us nothing.
Eddie:	Nothing.
Annie:	I'm sorry to spoil it if you haven't listened to the Richard Simmons Was it called Where is Richard Simmons or?

Eddie:	Something like that.
Annie:	Has Richard Simmons disappeared or something like that?
Eddie:	And the punchline is, he sure has.
Annie:	Yeah, the punchline is nobody could find him. Or they found him in his house and they don't know where he is.
Eddie:	Yeah, he's dead.
Annie:	And they don't know what he's doing.
Eddie:	He's basically done being a public figure. He's in his hole. He's good.
Annie:	So fascinating. So I'm jonesing for one of those. We need one of those. I don't know that we've had one of those in
Eddie:	No, no.
Annie:	I feel like the Richard Simmons' was the last one, and that was probably three years ago.
Eddie:	I feel like the podcast industry is changing substantially. I feel like we still have not seen the full effects of a post-COVID world of it. Because there's so many, and so they consolidated. Networks are great, but it also is just like they've got a very specific brand. I think part of that was that you could have these little weird independent shows just all of a sudden exist, you know? And now it's Yeah. I don't know that it won't exist again.
Annie:	Did you listen to Skamanda?
Eddie:	Mm-mm.
Annie:	That was one that a lot of our friends listened to. It's a scam by a woman named what do you bet?
Eddie:	I'm gonna go Amanda.
Annie:	Nailed it. I know a lot of people listen to Scamanda. I started it and I couldn't really get into it, but a lot of people liked it and I support them liking it. Same way people feel about red peppers. I respect you enjoying them. I'm never going to.

Eddie:	Oh, you don't?
Annie:	Not the red hot chili peppers. I love them. But peppers as a vegetable, I'm very out on.
Eddie:	Fine. And who cares? I mean, you just do what you do.
Annie:	Also, dear every Mexican restaurant, don't put onions and peppers together all the time. Some of us are only 50% interested in that.
Eddie:	They are two completely different taste profiles that don't have to stick together.
Annie:	Yes, yes.
Eddie:	And it's okay. And I know that people are going to I'm fine if people want to send us recommendations, I'm fine with listening to it.
Annie:	Of what to listen to? Sure, agreed.
Eddie:	I also don't know what you're looking for is the zeitgeist moment. And that we know doesn't exist.
Annie:	The Serial Zeitgeist moment was unparalleled to me. Even now it's unparalleled.
Eddie:	That was welcome to podcasting. That was like the Beatles on Ed Sullivan where it was like-
Annie:	I'm gonna Google it right now in hopes that it was What year would you guess Serial was?
Eddie:	Ooh, 2011.
Annie:	Oh, see, I think it's closer to 15, which is today's episode, technically. Serial season one, 2014.
Eddie:	Wow.
Annie:	Yeah. 2014.
Eddie:	Oh, yeah.

Annie:	Well done. That was a great recap. Speaking of 10 years, see you in August at the Ryman Auditorium.
Eddie:	Annie, I am-
Annie:	I can't wait.
Eddie:	I am so honored that you asked. I can't believe it's happening.
Annie:	Are you kidding? I'm so happy you're coming.
Eddie:	Are you pumped?
Annie:	Yeah, I am. I mean, for our friends listening, it's sold out, so there aren't any more tickets. There are a lot of my friends who are not going to get to come because they all thought we'd have tickets for them and we don't. And we're only doing one night.
	I mean, the fun thing now, Eddie, is what our team is doing behind the scenes, is now that we know the 2,300 people that are gonna be in the room, we get to build a show for them and build a weekend for them. Instead of spending our energy filling the room, we get to spend our energy building the right weekend for everyone. And that's awesome.
Eddie:	I mean, it's cool. Like, you texted me a thing. I don't know if it'll come to fruition or not.
Annie:	Oh, I know. Of what we're gonna do on stage.

Eddie: Oh, you're deep in a creative process, and it's so fun. Can I ask you, like... I'll probably end up asking you this at the Ryman, too, because I just can't, like... Do you have any sense of, like, this is happening? Like, do you have a sense of, like, um... So, okay. So, I've made a podcast, right, and I've built a thing, and I've done a thing, and you see it grow a little bit.

You've grown a thing from 2014 to like you sold out the Ryman in no time. You're getting real... like, Lady A's gonna be there. Like, real fancy people there, and you filled this iconic place, and people are coming. Has it at all dawned on you what you've breathed into existence? Do you know what I mean?

Annie: I mean, you know at this point I am a cog in a machine that is much more talented than me, but... I mean, yeah, I do think... I am so thankful for all the iterations of this show that got us here. Right before you and I started recording, we just had a meeting with some of the network team and sat around and talked about a lot of the growth plans for That Sounds Fun, the podcast.

I mean, I kind of was like, I mean, I guess I need to be here in this meeting, but I really don't because they're saying like, okay, you do this and you do this and you do this. And the guy leading the meeting said, the reason podcasts fail is the podcaster tries to do all this by themselves.

- Eddie: Oh, yeah.
- Annie: And I did have to do a lot of it by myself. But also in 2014 and in 2015, we didn't have to build reels, and we didn't have to build YouTube shorts, and we weren't trying to put everything on YouTube, and we weren't trying. Which, for everyone listening, you can watch all of our shows on YouTube this year.

Eddie: Which, by the way-

- Annie: So you can go watch me and Eddie.
- Eddie: Didn't know that. So last time-

Annie: Till right now?

Eddie: Till somebody tweeted or something or sent out a thing like, Hey, you can watch it on YouTube. I looked awful. So I am-

Annie: No, you didn't.

Eddie:	So I'm ready now. I've got backlighting. I've got a plant strategically placed.
Annie:	You do have a plant. You do have a new plant. I'm so sorry, Eddie.
Eddie:	Oh, you don't need to be sorry. I'm a thousand percent sure someone told me.
Annie:	We sent you the wrong link, so we don't tell you we're recording. This is just put together with duct tape and a microphone.
Eddie:	That sounded like I was dogging you. I wasn't. I probably wasn't paying attention. I just wasn't.
Annie:	No, no, no. It's totally fine. I'm sorry. We will, we
Eddie:	No, no, no. I'm on YouTube. I'm ready for it.
Annie:	Yeah. I mean, I think one of the advantages I have at this point is I have the people to help me do the parts that they're best at. So all I have to do is this part. I was in that meeting and I cared, but what I really was thinking about was, okay, when I talk to Eddie in 30 minutes, we got to make sure we do this. And I got to tell him that I laid half in my bedroom and half in the bathroom. And you know, like, I was doing that.
Eddie:	And that, in and of itself, is the secret sauce. Because if you only thought about the other stuff, right? Like you
Annie:	We wouldn't get to do this part.
Eddie:	Mm-mm. And you're texting me very specific ideas about what's going to happen on stage at the Ryman, and that is very granular and very creative. To make that happen, there would be ten things that would need More than that. There are people that would need to get there, there are props that would need to be made, there's all kinds of But I think that's the neat thing is you're still generating this thing.
Annie:	Thanks to my team letting me have space to do that. You know, the only way that happens is if people make space for it, for me to do that. So I am really thankful for that. That is so fun.
Eddie:	Do you remember by chance the word for 2015?
Annie:	My word for 2015. No. Do you?

Eddie:	No, I have no idea. I just was looking at key episodes and episode three was word for 2015. I feel like I wanna know this.
Annie:	I know. I think what Sarah Rademacher at the time, my assistant Sarah and I, we went through and I think what we did on episode three, we recorded it at my dining room table. And I think we talked about how do you find your word for the year.
Eddie:	Okay.
Annie:	Isn't that hilarious?
Eddie:	It is.
Annie:	Also, 2015, what a year. Also, for everybody keeping track, Eddie and Annie, not friends in 2015.
Eddie:	Did not know each other.
Annie:	Fans, but not friends.
Eddie:	Right. Had a little bit Yes, no. Right, did not know each other.
Annie:	We crossed over into friendship in '16?
Eddie:	'16. Early '16 I think is when-
Annie:	So, in March, we'll talk about our villain origin story.
Eddie:	Right, right.
Annie:	Yeah. Meaning us. That's the villains, just to be clear. We are the ones.
Eddie:	Right. We're the villains.
Annie:	Annie and Eddie is the villain.
Eddie:	Dual villains.
Annie:	Yeah, yeah, yeah. If you were a villain, I think you'd dress just like that. I don't think you'd dress any differently.
Eddie:	No, this is my villain outfit.

Annie:	Yeah, yeah. The hat is the villainous part.
Eddie:	I like this hat. What do you think?
Annie:	It's a cool hat.
Eddie:	I wear it all the time.
Annie:	Really?
Eddie:	All the time.
Annie:	You're a baseball cap guy, though.
Eddie:	Yes, that's fair. When I'm in my special fancy boy mode, which I am now, it's this hat. You know what I mean? When I'm, like, got my fancies on. It's a light spring day. Sometimes when I'm in my dad mode or working outside will switch to
Annie:	Or go into a Nationals game.
Eddie:	And also because I knew I was on YouTube, I realized there's so much baseball stuff behind me, I didn't want to be like that guy.
Annie:	Happy spring training, by the way. Please hurry back baseball. Please hurry back baseball. This window between when Taylor and Travis kiss on a football field and opening day is the desert of sports for me.
Eddie:	It is so long.
Annie:	No offense to the NBA. Here's who we're getting emails from: chiropractors. NBA players, hockey coaches. Those are the people who are about to email us because I'm about to tell you hockey and basketball just don't keep me in the winter. They don't keep me warm in the winter.
Eddie:	They're fine. I mean, it's not everybody likes all sports and you and I are similar in that. Sure, I'll go to an NBA game. I'll watch them every once in a while. I'll watch the finals. Good times. But I don't have like a deep-
Annie:	I watch March Madness because that's where all the men are. The single men are in sports bars watching March Madness. I'll be there.
Eddie:	Same. Same. I'll be there with this hat on. Hello, gentlemen.

Annie:	A tip of the cap to you, gents. Things I was doing in 2015. Going to March Madness at Crow's Nest. So it's really worked well for me for the last nine years.
Eddie:	Oh, that's cool.
Annie:	Same bar. Same place. Everybody goes to the same place to watch March Madness. So nothing has changed. Nothing has changed. Ain't nothing changed but my lip, as they say. So spring training is what I was excited about. That's what we got.
Eddie:	It makes me feel good. Okay, also podcast episodes of note. I like these because these are your early episodes. So this is when you-
Annie:	Also, by the way, you're about to list out the only podcast for 2015.
Eddie:	Oh, was that? Oh, really? You only had eight?
Annie:	Yes.
Eddie:	What was the deal?
Annie:	Because when I got to the end of that episode with Emily P. Freeman, which was number nine of total, because we also had notice Dave Barnes. Please read out the title of Dave Barnes' episodes.
Eddie:	Episode 6A, Dave Barnes. Episode 6B, Dave Barnes. So, why we didn't just call it episode Why didn't you just call it?
Annie:	Seven. Why didn't I just make it one? It was only an hour. I was really going for that 30-minute window.
Eddie:	Oh, you really were. Oh, I see what you did. But also
Annie:	These eight, I edited myself.
Eddie:	Oh my gosh.
Annie:	Got to the end of the eighth one and I said, "I cannot do this."
Eddie:	Oh.
Annie:	"I am not talented." And then within a few months, I hired our mutual friend and dear love of our lives, Chad Snavely.

Eddie:	Oh, you did. I didn't know this was that early. Okay, so you knew. I didn't know. So, funny, because okay, so then after this, did you do any more episodes in 2015?
Annie:	No.
Eddie:	So when did this show then start again?
Annie:	2016.
Eddie:	Wow. And then has it stopped since then?
Annie:	No.
Eddie:	What an interesting thing.
Annie:	Two episodes in 2014, eight in 2015, 850 since then.
Eddie:	Wow. I totally get it though. Editing your own show, like for anybody that makes their own show, it is brutally hard.
Annie:	You did it for Annie and Eddie and I will never be able to thank you enough.
Eddie:	Well, of course, and doing the best we can. I mean, it's so and the new activist, I've edited it all. Like, it's so much
Annie:	Gosh.
Eddie:	Just getting to talk is not easy, but it is like it's just so hard to edit. Anyhow, so, of course.
Annie:	I hated it. And I wasn't even like taking out ums. I was doing like, bring the music up, have an intro, bring the music down. And I would just toil over it.
Eddie:	Cut out super embarrassing things and generally let it roll, right?
Annie:	Yeah, that's about it.
Eddie:	Okay.
Annie:	That's about it. Cut out anything that I had vulnerability hangover about.
Eddie:	We gotta just say you had Shauna on, which we love.

Annie:	Shauna Niequist. I love her.
Eddie:	Shauna Niequist.
Annie:	I know. All these people, Shauna, Jess Turner Oh, let me tell you about my interview with Jessica Turner, episode number five. Go to her house, record the whole thing, an hour, 40 minutes, something like that, it's great.
Eddie:	Bringing your own equipment. I mean, you're doing the whole thing.
Annie:	100% bringing one microphone and my laptop, set the microphone between us, get home, and have lost the entire episode.
Eddie:	Oh no. So what'd you do?
Annie:	So I had to do it again.
Eddie:	That's what-
Annie:	Went back to her house, asked her to do it again. I mean, so generous of her to re-record. I've had to re-record twice, Jessica Turner and Drew Holcomb.
Eddie:	Both people were totally sweet about it.
Annie:	I mean, when Drew showed up, when he came back for the second one, there was a bottle of his favorite bourbon on the podcast table. I was like, you're my hero, and this is the least I could do.
Eddie:	And I'm sure he was dear about it.
Annie:	Oh, he was like Yes, he was so kind about it. Just like any of our actual friends would have been, but still.
Eddie:	Right, I know. But gosh. Oh, that's a terrible feeling.
Annie:	I had to record it twice. I mean, editing myself, losing an episode, not knowing how to do it. I couldn't do it anymore. I was like, "I can't do it by myself. I don't have the skill for this."
Eddie:	You need an editor.
Annie:	And this was really when I learned: hire people to do what they do best so you can do what is best and the money to pay them will show up. I mean, it was challenging

financially. 2016 is when *Looking for Lovely* came out and I... or sorry. Yes, when *Looking for Lovely* came out and I also was applying for part-time jobs.

Eddie:	Wow. Okay, hold on.
Annie:	My fourth book and I was applying for part-time jobs.
Eddie:	Hold on, Looking for Lovely came out in '16 or this year? Or in 15?
Annie:	I wrote it in '15 and it came out in '16.
Eddie:	Golly. So the plan was okay, so when do you start writing it in '15? Not that we have to get so
Annie:	The whole year. I think we signed the deal at the end of '14.
Eddie:	Oh, okay.
Annie:	Because <i>Let's All Be Brave</i> came out in '14 and I think we signed the deal early in '15 or end of '14.
Eddie:	But that also makes sense because you're trying to write a book and then you want to throw a podcast on top of it and it's just that's just too much.
Annie:	Too much. Okay. So I was like, "I would rather get a part-time job at the Parent Teacher Store so that I can pay Chad Michael Snavely.
Eddie:	Is that what you did?
Annie:	Because I love making this podcast. I ended up not having to because I ended up taking speaking gigs, but I filled out the application. I did the interview. I did the whole process at the Parent Teacher Store. I filled out the paperwork, I went and did the interview, I told them the hours I was available. I did all of it. And then we had a multi-speaking thing come in. So I told them I was no longer available because I had to be gone.
Eddie:	We should just get up there at the Ryman and just dog them and be like, "You didn't even think we could do it, did you? You thought she'd never make it Parent Teacher Store.
Annie:	Chad will be there, by the way, if anybody wants his autograph. He's one of the first people I called and said, anybody who has put their paws on this podcast, we had

tickets for. I was like, Chad, you and Casey, his wife, I was like, please come to the Ryman. And he said, of course.

- Eddie: Okay, listen, can I tell you, I had to send an uncomfortable email and text you today, and I worried about it for 48 hours. Because we have friends coming with us that are just coming because it's like, let's go, let's go on a road trip. And we're all going, and so then I was like, do you ask for tickets? How does this work? And it worked well, but my gosh, I was like... Do you ever get in that thing where you're like, overly sweating a thing? And it's like, because of course, but it's just like, you know, the Ryman in small, tickets are a funny thing. It turns into a whole deal.
- Annie: We have a very small handful left that we've saved for people that might... Also if I'm in love by August, I need a seat for whoever I'm in love with.
- Eddie: Okay.
- Annie: We're saving one seat.
- Eddie: Oh, well, I mean, I will kick whoever out. I mean, it doesn't matter. One of the Lady As cannot be there. Certainly. I don't know which one but certainly one of them.
- Annie: You're bringing him on stage if I'm in love by August.
- Eddie: Yeah. And giving him one of their seats.
- Annie: Oh, wow. He's going to join Lady A.
- **Eddie:** I also assume he probably has a nice singing voice or can play guitar. So you could be up there.
- Annie: Great. Okay. He has a nice singing voice. He plays guitar. I prefer piano. Is that okay?
- **Eddie:** Do you like a piano boy?
- Annie: I do. You know why? Because anyone who knows how to play piano has a very tender heart.
- **Eddie:** I do. I feel that. I feel that. I get it. And I am a guitar player boy. We're a dime a dozen. We all played in Young Life.

Eddie:	Is there another one? Is there by chance another one of them from the office that you know? I hate to put you on the spot, but I love these so much.
Annie:	I know. I'm trying to think. Becca's is really good, but I don't think she's here today. I could go ask her. Craig, do you remember anybody else's?
Eddie:	What's Craig's?
Annie:	Craig, did you have one beforehand? Or you can still have one. Did you have one? Did you have words for one?
Craig:	I don't think I had it down to two words. Not like you. You were ready.

- **Eddie:** Oh, I love him. I love all of these things. But he can go back and listen to this and go like, "I superseded."

Annie:	And certainly the descriptor as well, before people start putting them in the comments, the descriptor as well is not about who you actually end up with. It's very rare. It's just the person who catches your eye off the top. I think I've only dated two bald guys ever. So, there's been more haired men.
Eddie:	And I think it's also an important caveat that this needs to be light and superficial.
Annie:	A hundred percent light and superficial. Gru. Again, Gru.
Eddie:	We don't need to get into character. We know, godly, blah, blah. We got it.
Annie:	No, no, no. We understand. We understand what matters to your spirit. I need to know what matters to your eyes on first take.
Eddie:	Fallon wants that boy up at 5 a.m. running laps and lifting weights and then vaping with his bros.
Annie:	And then vaping the rest of the day.
Eddie:	He is blowing gigantic vape lungs.
Annie:	Unfortunately, because she's not coming over here yet, that is what was gonna be believed about her.
Eddie:	She is also just so dear.
Annie:	Oh, perfect Fallon! Fallon, perfect!
Eddie:	Fallon, we were talking about the boy that would catch your interest and you had told-
Annie:	What was your two-word descriptor?
Fallon:	Dirty nerdy.
Eddie:	Dirty nerdy. What does that mean?
Annie:	Explain it.
Eddie:	Who is that?
Fallon:	It's like he's put together, he's sophisticated, he's smart, but he also has a little edge to him, you know?

Eddie:	No, what's that edge? What does that mean?
Annie:	Which is kind of who you ended up with, though.
Fallon:	Oh, 100%.
Annie:	Wow.
Fallon:	Like, just like, you know, loves Jesus, maybe likes to drink and sing, couple curse words. I don't know.
Eddie:	I understand. No, I understand. No, I get it. I get it. He's got that little yeah, edge was the right word.
Fallon:	Just a little edge.

Annie:	Pecs.
Eddie:	Like David Beckham?
Fallon:	Pecs and Specs.
Annie:	Pecs and Specs. That was it.
Fallon:	Pecs and Specs.
Eddie:	Who's a famous person that would Who's that?
Annie:	Who is a famous person that would be Pecs and Specs?
Eddie:	So he's gotta be strong and wear glasses?
Annie:	Yeah, kind of Superman.
Fallon:	Like Clark Kent.
Annie:	Clark Kent, yes. See, look at us.

Eddie:	Oh yeah, I do get that. I do get that.
Annie:	Eddie, have you ever heard about how Fallon met her boyfriend?
Eddie:	No, I assume it was some sort of swiping situation. Oh, how did you meet?

Annie:	He's great. Very, very accomplished. Very talented.

Fallon:	Hodges.
Eddie:	Oh, that's a cute name. Okay. Hodges.
Annie:	Are you fine with the world knowing that?
Fallon:	Yeah.
Annie:	Okay.

Eddie:	Are you? Are you sure? Because we're on a podcast.
Annie:	Sorry to interrupt your day, but I was like, I cannot remember. I was talking about my bald villain and I did not remember.
Eddie:	And it's different than the one that you had shared with me before. So I'm glad you found Hodges.
Annie:	Oh yeah. Did you hear the one that you shared with Eddie? I just wanted to say my joke again. It was vaping crossfitter.
Fallon:	I cannot. You just want him to take gigantic cokes off of VapeBond every morning. The whole deal, anyway.
Annie:	He said, "Oh, I was just texting Fallon, and this is what she told me." Are there any others that people said at the table that day that I'm not remembering? Sizable superhero. Yeah, that was Jamie's. Pecs and specs. Dirty nerdy, bald villain.
Eddie:	I'm trying to come up with my guy, and I can only come up with the name of a person that I met, and I can't figure out how to-
Annie:	Okay, say the name of it, and we'll tell you what the word is.
Eddie:	No, he's not famous, he's just a guy I know, who just is like, every time I see him-
Fallon:	Maybe say it, maybe we'll know him.
Eddie:	Jack West.
Fallon:	Oh, sure.
Eddie:	I'm like, he's so handsome, but he's got grayish hair, and he's just really ruggedly handsome.
Fallon:	Silver Fox.
Annie:	Or is it like a silver otter or some other thing?
Fallon:	Silver wolf?
Eddie:	Still would do like an Iron Man pretty casually. And then also would be comfortable being a counselor and then probably would also hike.

Annie:	Isn't she the best?
Eddie:	Oh, that was great.
Annie:	Fallon Klug runs the podcast network.
Eddie:	Love her.
Annie:	Runs out of the podcast studio also.
Eddie:	Snack show.
Annie:	So, 2015, Eddie, we've really done it again.
Eddie:	Right. A year that we barely talked about. Plenty of films, plenty of other things. We got a little bit of your life. Who cares? 2015.
Annie:	Who cares? Yeah, this is exactly what they're expecting on these episodes.
Eddie:	This is what it is. This is what it is. Kids are getting home from school. It's time.
Annie:	Oh, okay. It's time.
Eddie:	I love talking to you.
Annie:	Well, thanks for making time to do this, Eddie. We'll see you next month when we for sure spend the whole time talking about 2016.
Eddie:	I am flop sweating. I cannot wait.
Annie:	And I cannot wait for people to hear. And I just can't wait to see their words.
Eddie:	Oh, I love it.
Annie:	It'll be great.

Eddie:	All right. Bye, buddies.
Annie:	All right, friends Oh, I forgot to say wash your hands. Oh, boy. Oh, man.

Eddie: In two, one, go.

Annie: Go wash your hands.

Eddie: Bye, buddies. There we go.

Annie: There we go.
