Annie: Annie Kaufholz, welcome back to That Sounds Fun. As it should be. As it should

Eddie: I mean, I kind of do, but I also was trying to be very aware of the fact that the last

show was... there wasn't even on rails. It was a whole different train on a whole

different set of rails.

Annie: But it was dreamy.

Eddie: Well, yeah. Super-fast recap. I loved it.

Annie: I loved it. So did the people.

Eddie: Right. You went to SNL. All I did was ask questions for an hour about that. It was

fantastic.

Annie: Man, the Beavis and Butthead skit continues to have life.

Eddie: I know. You sent me a thing. They were at the... It wasn't like the Met Gala. Oh, no,

no-

Annie: No, it was the Fall Guy premiere. They dressed as the Beavis and Butthead

characters. That's very funny.

Eddie: What would you do if you had to go to the Met Gala? What do you think about that

whole thing?

Eddie: What are you wearing? Hold on, hold on, hold on.

Annie: I had a dream last night.

Eddie: Okay, go, but we gotta get back. But go.

dream that Jimmy Fallon... we might ask Jimmy to Fallon. There's no way he'll do

Eddie: But if there's anybody who would fall into the "there's no way he'll do it," and then

Annie: I know.

Eddie: He's like a Bill Murray type. Bill Murray's been pseudo-canceled, so nobody push

Annie: Yeah, yeah, right. But you might, right?

Eddie: Probably.

Annie: I know. I do not know what I'm wearing because we haven't picked all that out yet.

Eddie: But it's like fancy, right?

Annie: Yes, it'll be... yes. Not like promy, it won't be a Met Gala dress.

Eddie: Yeah, yeah, but I've seen the advertisements for it. Like you did the yellow shirt

thing, yellow dress thing. That yellow dress is neat, it's nice.

Annie: Thank you, thank you. It wrinkled so quickly. We returned it after that one picture.

Eddie: The whole look is a little bit... it's like fancy. Even all of the That Sounds Fun stuff,

it's beautiful, but it's elegant. It's progressing.

Annie: That's the goal. Yeah. Thanks.

Eddie: It's lovely. Anyhow, I just realized like, I gotta show up and... I gotta show up.

Annie: Something besides that. Maybe not. You're allowed to just be you. We're not going

to coat-check any of you. You aren't going to be bossed around.

Eddie: Hold on. We got a-

Annie: Hey, so we-

Eddie: Yeah, go, go, go, go, go, go.

Annie: We got a what?

Eddie: There's another pop culture thing that I have purposefully given myself-

Annie: I hope it's the same thing.

Eddie: I've given myself no leeway to think about it because of the Tom Brady roast.

Annie: No, that's not what I was going to talk about. So great. Let's talk about, man, the

Tom Brady. I didn't watch it either. I've just seen some clips. But roast in general,

man, feel brutal.

Eddie: I watched clips of it and then knew there were certain people in it that I wanted to

see, like, how would they... It was vicious. I mean, honestly, in real life, like, if it's funny, funny wins. I don't know that they're... I don't have it too soon. I don't. Annie: No.

Eddie: Why did he do this? Why is he there? I mean, they're saying...

Annie: But also, did you see the clip where he made the joke about if the NFL was gonna

million and I'd have told him I did it?

Eddie: Yeah.

Annie: That made me lose respect for him, honestly. Because I thought, you cheated?

You're telling everyone right now that you cheated in the NFL and you knew it and you didn't confess? I was not impressed with the character displayed in that storytelling. I'm sure he has very good character in a lot of ways, I was not

impressed with the character displayed that he told us, no one else told us, he told

us, I was not impressed.

Eddie: Yeah, and it was just-

Annie: Would you ever do a roast? I would never be on either side.

Eddie: I am able to dish it out and not take it like a hundred percent.

Annie: Would you really dish it out? Would you really be able to look someone in the face

and make fun of them for real?

Eddie: I think I could in a way that wouldn't burn them. I don't really think I could, to be

honest. I don't think I could. I think it's in me. Like, if I wanted to just tap into my worst demons and go, like, what's the meanest thing I could say and it's okay? I'm

sure I could conjure it. But I don't mind.

Some of it's funny and some of it is... I mean, there have been roast jokes over time

that have made their way into the Instagram algorithm that just destroyed me. I

think it's so funny. Norm MacDonald roasting Bob Saget.

Annie: Oh, I've never seen it.

Eddie: He did like the anti-roast and decided to do nothing. But it was just... anyhow.

Annie: Like saying like he's making really mean jokes, like, but you are the nicest guy in

the world. Like that kind of thing?

Eddie: It was actually like, You sir are a dirty scoundrel. And then he just waited and it

didn't get any worse.

Annie: Oh, right, right, Got it, got it, got it. Okay.

Eddie: Anyway.

Annie: Wow.

Eddie: So I get it. But this was just like... it was almost like a fight back against cancel

culture. Like we're going to say it's all cancelable. Everything that was said by everyone is cancelable. So in that respect, it was almost like a display of just... It

felt gluttonous. It just felt like we're just going to just mow down on this.

But then the craziest thing to me was that it was executive-produced by Tom Brady.

So he paid for it.

Annie: He paid for it.

Eddie: Because sometimes I get like, okay, your celebrity is kind of waning. You need

something to get back in there. I got it. Like the David Hasselhoff roast, you're like,

you're welcome, David Hasselhoff. Like, you didn't know what was going on.

Annie: Who else pays for it? Oh, I guess Comedy Central probably has paid for a bunch of

Eddie: Yes. And it's probably a whole Netflix... Yeah.

Annie: Yeah. Yeah.

Eddie: Okay. What was yours?

Annie: He paid for it himself.

Eddie: He paid for it. So he both... Yeah. And because he's an executive producer, he got to

say, so he could have said, This is an off-limits thing. I don't know. It's just the whole thing, the whole culture. It was like a cultural moment that I was like, Oh, I don't like the way this feels. Okay, okay, what was the other pop culture thing that

Eddie: Oh, great, I'm glad you... good.

going back and forth releasing songs about each other. I think I don't know how

culture works anymore.

Eddie: Well, you do because you were a kid and I was a kid during Tupac and Biggie.

Annie: Yeah, that's true.

Eddie: That's why I think this is weird. It feels scary to me because I remember Tupac and

Biggie and being like, Oh, this wasn't entertainment. Like two people died. Like

this was... I don't mean to make it serious.

Annie: No, no, no. You're right.

Eddie: I'm not saying Kendrick Lamar and Drake are like that. But I was like-

Annie: But Kendrick Lamar won a Pulitzer in 2018. Drake had the number one song in

2018, and they're very mad at each other.

Eddie: Do you know why?

Annie: Uh-uh.

Eddie: Are they mad about the Met Gala? Is it a TikTok thing?

Annie: Yeah, I don't know why they're mad. I don't know why they're mad. Someone does.

Eddie: Annie, this is one of two podcasts that I want to start, which is people, 40 plus,

figuring out pop culture references out loud.

Annie: Do you know that's kind of... there is kind of a show like that that we won't point

toward. But there is a little bit of a show like that that is... it is very funny. So

maybe that is one of the... what's the other one you want to start?

Eddie: I want me and my brother and one of my very good friends... we play Xbox once a

week and the first half hour is us figuring out how to all connect together and get the same game on and get in the same room. And it's literally my brother going, Okay, push X. No, you push A, push X. Somewhere in that half hour, I just start crying laughing, because it's just three grown adult men who can't really figure it all

Annie: Now, isn't that what Twitch is? Isn't Twitch people watching you play games?

Eddie: I know, but those people are good. This is three guys in polo shirts, drinking a Diet

Dr. Thunder.

Annie: I'll tell you what, the... Wow, Diet Dr. Thunder, by the way, new bottle I saw.

Eddie: I know.

Annie: New marketing.

Eddie: This is too soon.

Annie: Same great taste?

Eddie: It is. Yeah, it is great. So that would have been my Drake and Kendrick. Had they

changed the taste, this would have been me versus [Lauren?].

Annie: You'd have been riding diss tracks?

Eddie: Okay, yes. Okay, you were saying a thing, and then we gotta get back to the diss

track thing, because that's important.

Annie: Oh no, I just don't know anymore. I just thought, here are the things that have

happened since the last time I talked to Eddie. Feels like celebrity culture's in a

weird spot.

Eddie: Very weird, very weird. Not guite sure what to make of it.

Annie: Such a good reminder to all of us, do not chase being a celebrity. It does not look

fun

Eddie: No, don't go chasing waterfalls. That's one of the main things that you know.

Annie: Thank you. Thank you for that. I need you to know one of my favorite people that

shows up in my Discover tab is on Twitch, and he is Jacques Ze Whipper, and he is

at Renaissance Festivals, he does whips.

Eddie: Oh.

Annie: And he plays Twitch sometimes. I don't know what I've done that the Lord would

see fit to put him in my Discover tab, but it is fascinating. I love a Renaissance

festival, man.

Eddie: There's a lot of ways your algorithm can get you there, and we don't have to talk

about them all.

Annie: I don't know how.

Eddie: But there's like some totally pure, lovely ways, and then there's some weird ways.

But either way-

Annie: Yeah, no, I mean, probably Renaissance, he's married, he has a cat. I'm not trying to

date him. He's just a very interesting follow-up.

Eddie: Oh, it wasn't even that, but that makes it even better. But anyhow, what your search

terms would be for dating? Like Renaissance, Old English.

Annie: Renaissance faire. Yeah, it's a fascinating thing.

Eddie: Has an eagle-claw necklace holding a red marble.

Annie: So you got to go.

Eddie: Right, because of our enhanced-

Annie: Did you dip your hand in wax? Did you make a wax hand?

Eddie: Of course, of course.

Annie: What'd you do? Did you do peace sign or did you do I love you?

Eddie: Of course.

Annie: Peace sign.

Eddie: It's the 90s, of course, I did peace.

Annie: Did you do the rainbow? I always did rainbow.

Eddie: Of course. Yes. Every color you can do in the only order you can figure out and

then it sits in your room for 10 years until you're going off to college and then the

end of it is just this. Like, by the time you leave for school.

Annie: Yeah, because it's gotten hot. You've left it in front of a window at some point.

Eddie: Oh, have I ever told you about the presidential wax museum in Florida?

Annie: No.

Eddie: Annie! End of show. Here we go. So Bri finds these amazing things all the time,

this was the like age of MoviePass. Remember when that was like a thing for five

minutes?

Annie: I loved MoviePass.

Eddie: I did too. And I think I've seen all these movies because of MoviePass.

Annie: Really?

Eddie: I'm pretty sure.

Annie: What was your favorite of all of those?

Eddie: Oh, Black Panther.

Annie: Same.

Eddie: That was a-

Annie: Black Panther was so moving.

Eddie: Oh, that was-

Annie: Absolutely beautiful.

Eddie: Angela Bassett in that movie was spectacular.

Annie: I also loved *Avenger Infinity War*. I thought that was a really good Avenger. I am

sorry we have crested over... like we've kind of gone to the backside of all the Avenger stories where we're still going to get them, but kind of like the build, the build, the build, the like, what are the secret Easter eggy things everywhere? All

that it's kind of-

Eddie: I loved all that.

Annie: ...happened, it seems like. I loved all that.

Eddie: I loved it all. I loved it all. So I've never seen Deadpool though. I've never seen any

of them.

Annie: I've never seen any of them either.

Eddie: I'm sure they're good, I just never really.

Annie: The *Meg*. You have not seen the *Meg*.

Eddie: No, because I think it was scary, right?

Annie: Okay, I need you to know something about me. I find the greatest rest and

enjoyment in movies that are... I wanna say silly, but this is not silly.

Eddie: Are they campy or bad?

Annie: That are just a little bit past... they're jumping the shark movies, to be hilarious.

They're just a little bit past what seems realistic. So there's a little bit of like, are there still Megs under the trench in the bottom of the ocean that we can't get to?

Because we know less about the ocean than we know about space, Eddie.

Eddie: What is the Meg? Is it a shark?

Annie: A Megalodon.

Eddie: Oh, I see.

Annie: So this is your dinosaur shark that is like four to five times the size of a great white.

I love the *Meg* and the *Meg* 2. I actually deeply love both movies. Like if you said to me, what would be a perfect, like, you've just worked really hard on a project, or you've just come through a really tough season of your job, or you've been traveling a lot, if you got to do anything for a day, I'd be like, give me a movie theater that runs Meg and *Meg* 2 back to back. And I can't bring my phone, but I can have Coke Ices. I mean, to me, that's like the epitome. I honestly talked to someone about

on May 4th. They were playing it for a day.

Annie: Oh, that's a cool idea. Like a Phantom Events thing?

water. You fall off your surfboard and you land on his schnoz and you're done. He

eats you right then.

Eddie: Schnoz.

Annie: You land right on his nose. It feels like a wild decision that people are like, Yeah,

no, this is totally safe. I am swimming. I don't know the depth below me. I don't know what is in it, but I think I should just kick. I should just kick and bring

attention to my body."

Eddie: Have you ever been somewhere that has like clear, clear ocean? So like Hawaii or

Puerto Rico or something where you can see all the way down? Because I wonder

if that changes it for you.

Annie: Yeah. No. You know, I had... Have we ever talked about this? No, it was earlier

than this. I was like, could it be 2018? I've had a couple of panic attacks in my life,

proper ones, and one of them was in water, and it was in Hawaii. My family and I

had made this agreement that if they got up and went and saw the sunrise over a volcano with me, then I would go scuba diving with them.

So I had just my face in the water, perfectly clear, everyone's swimming fine, and there was a shadow and I could not move my arms or my legs. Mr. F. Downs had to push me back to the boat.

Eddie: Oh, little Annie.

Annie: Oh, you wish I was little. I was in college.

Eddie: Not as cute.

Eddie:

Annie: Right, not as cute when the captain is pulling my arms and Mr. F. Downs is pushing my tail feathers to get me out of the water. It was terrible. It was terrible. a workplace. What would that be called? Station.

Eddie: Like a laboratory?

Annie: Underwater station.

Eddie: Oh, I see.

this point. So, his mind is just...

Annie: But he doesn't even know. I mean, I'm like, you get... Here's what I kept thinking. I

kept thinking, this poor man has got one life. We get one life. And two years of his one life will now shape the rest of his life because he was locked in a room by himself. And he even said when it was finally over he had a hard time knowing

how to talk to people or look in their faces because he'd been alone for a year.

really good documentarian producer. So able to fund it, get money from it. But I bet he has cool, interesting... except that those documentaries they do, everybody who does like those kind of... they don't do juicy documentaries. It's always like

feel-good documentaries about... I don't know.

Annie: Yeah, you want the ones about *The Contestant* whose life is ruined by being locked

in... locked-

Eddie: Thank you. If someone isn't holding their breath underwater for a long time or

being tortured on a game show, I don't want that show.

Annie: That producer.

Eddie: That guy was shady.

Annie: Okay. One last thing I want to ask you about. In 2018, I read the entire catalog, the

entire library of Madeleine L'Engle books because I loved her so much. I had no idea how much fiction she'd written. I went back and read *Wrinkle in Time* again, all the things. Is there an author whose books you would love to read...? Like if all the other books that are on your list disappeared and they went pick one author and read that library and that unlocks other authors once you read this, who would you

read?

Eddie: Generic answer, but it's John Steinbeck.

Annie: Oh, wow.

Eddie: Every John Steinbeck book I read just feels like...

Annie: *Grapes of Wrath*? What else? I'm sorry, I'm not sure what else is coming to mind.

Eddie: *Of Mice and Men.*

Annie: Of Mice and Men. Oh, that one made me cry in high school.

Eddie: Yeah, it was intense. I just read The *Grapes of Wrath* and I... again, and it was just

the way he speaks is just his writing and it's his painting of people and the

simplicity of it. Yeah, John Steinbeck, he has unlocked... he unlocked it all for me.

Annie: While we're standing here, I'm going to look up his full library because I don't

know what else he's written. I don't know what you're agreeing to.

Eddie: I haven't read anything by Madeleine L'Engle.

Annie: Oh, she's wonderful.

Eddie: Have I? A *Wrinkle in Time*? I probably read that.

Annie: East of Eden, John Steinbeck?

Eddie: Oh, yeah, yeah, yeah.

Annie: Cannery Row, The Pearl, The Red Pony, The Moon is Down, Tortilla Flat?

Eddie: Yeah.

Annie: Travels with Charley in Search of America. That sounds like a nice title.

Eddie: So I have a weird thing though, because I.. so I'm reading through right now all of

Hemingway.

Annie: Oh, you're already doing this.

Eddie: I'm deep in it, deep through Hemingway. And it's been pretty fun but he's not my

guy. I love his writing, but it's very sad and it hits me. Steinbeck though... and I got this from my friend Isaac and it's like an odd little thing, but I kind of love it, is that I'm, I don't want to burn through it because once it's done, it's done. And I still always have one more little thing I've never read. Like I've never read Cannery

Row and I know I could and I know it's out of order, but I just...

Annie: Just keep it. Out of order.

Eddie: But it's like... I don't know what it's like... It's like having like Paul Simon's

Graceland and knowing it's still in the cellophane and someday you can listen to it.

I don't know why.

Annie: There'll be a time where you're like, now's the time for me to read Cannery Row.

Eddie: Yeah, I'm gonna open up this old bottle of scotch and finally do this.

Annie: Forgive me, I don't know this. John Steinbeck lived until 80s, 90s?

Eddie: I have no idea. Recent history.

Annie: Hey Siri, when did John Steinbeck die?

Eddie: Maybe when did he live?

Annie: Sorry, that's a better question. 1902 to 1968.

Eddie: Well, that's a good run.

Annie: That's a handsome character.

Eddie: Yeah. He also does my, which I'm sure you as a writer would know this, but he

talks about how he writes. And he will sit and he'll get his typewriter out, he'll get everything. He has his little area to write. And he will not start typing until he has a very clear person in his mind on the other side of the desk. And he writes the whole book to a single character. So the whole thing he runs all of it through knowing who that is. Like, you can feel that. You're like, you're running this through a lens

of not only great storytelling, but...

Okay, Madeleine L'Engle. What should be the first book of hers that I read?

Annie: So you haven't read any? So you haven't read *Walking on Water* about creativity?

Eddie: I think I read *Wrinkle in Time* but I just don't remember. It would have been like-

Annie: Yeah, go Walking on Water. Walking on Water is the one where she writes about

creativity and writes about writing.

Eddie: Oh.

Annie: It's beautiful.

Eddie: So it's nonfiction?

Annie: Yes.

Eddie: Okay. But there's some of it's fiction too.

Annie: Yeah. She has a couple of adult novels, and then all The *Wrinkle in Time* series. But

she has a lot of memoir, essay-based books. Okay, we've talked about this, are you

on Goodreads?

Annie: I am on Goodreads as an author, so I am not on Goodreads as a reader, because

people are brutal. Speaking of beautiful garbage, the way people treat authors on Goodreads is very fine and honest. They're allowed to say whatever they want to say. I can't get away from it when I'm trying to look up books, and my ego's too

fragile.

Eddie: I mean, who wouldn't? I haven't experienced that, so it's a completely different

situation. I just like it because it categorizes and helps me remember.

Annie: Oh, it's great.

Eddie: I don't let anybody follow me, and I don't follow anyone. I think I follow Brianne

and like two friends, so it's a non-thing, but yeah, that's a different experience.

Annie: Okay, well, we've really done it for the month of May.

Eddie: Yeah, I loved it.

Annie: Let's do it again for June.

Eddie: Thanks for asking me to do this. I love doing this. I love being on the show with

you.

Annie: Ah, mutual.

Eddie: I loved it.

Annie: I enjoyed it so much. We ping-ponged everywhere. I hope everyone enjoyed it as

well as much as we did.

Eddie: I don't want to guide your creative team, but what I want the clip for this show to be

is quick clips of you going... of the revelations. I don't go in the ocean. Really? I don't do it at all. Really? I feel like there was so many of those moments that I was

like-

Annie: Craig, there is your challenge for the reel.

Eddie: There were so many things that we learned about you today.

Annie: Revelations. This is a learning day for us both.

Eddie: Revelations, Annie.

Annie: All right, friends, y'all have a great day. Go wash your hands.

Eddie: Yes. Bye, buddies.
