Annie:

**Annie:** Lisa, welcome back to That Sounds Fun.

**Lisa:** Oh, I always love joining you. You always create such a rich, different dynamic on

conversations.

**Annie:** Thank you. That means a lot to me. That's very kind. Give us an update on how all

your people are. Everybody's in Nashville now, the whole fam?

**Lisa:** No, no. We still have one son just hanging out in Colorado.

**Annie:** One prodigal.

**Lisa:** Just one. He keeps saying, "I'm going to move." You and I both know if you find

something, you got to pay more money than you wanted for it, you got to snatch it,

you got to jump. We just had our 9th grandbaby.

**Annie:** Oh my gosh.

**Lisa:** I know. So we have five grandsons, four granddaughters. It was a little girl. Her

name is Tatum Alice. I have six of my nine down the street. In all truth, one of our little grandsons is in heaven. We had just done the family gender reveal and found out that he had stopped developing. Jessica went in and got a DNC. We all grieved. We all grieved. We named him. We look forward to the day we get to be with him. Then they had another little boy and they named him Arthur. We have all of our

sons are still staying with the A names.

**Annie:** Well done to them. I think you know, but our family went through a similar story

where my sister lost her son TJ. Will you talk for a second? I've watched this in our family. It's a really unique grieving for grandparents too. It's a unique spot. Will you

talk about the grief of grandparents when babies are lost?

**Lisa:** I think it's because as a grandparent, you see the length of days. You have such an awareness of the richness of a life. It just hits you. Then of course, mothers always

question, what did I do wrong? Was it because I lifted this? Is it because I ate that?

It usually has nothing to do with this.

I will say, Annie, I am a firstborn. My mom lost three babies between me and my brother. I read this book. It was just the most profound book. It's a book called *Jesse Found in Heaven*. It was talking about when you lose a child, actually that child has been found in heaven. When I read it, I actually wept. I realized that I had a very distinct memory of my mom collapsing on the floor with a topic pregnancy and her telling me to go to one of the neighbor's house and me turning around and seeing an ambulance come and take my mom away.

So I've learned that even in that loss, there is promise, but there is mourning. And there's never a replacement. It's not like, Oh, well, they had another baby so that... There's never a replacement because something in your heart opens up. I celebrate his life, even though... he was named, he was a little boy and he's part of our family. Since I'm never going to meet him here, I get to meet him in eternity.

Annie:

I know. I think a lot about my grandmothers in heaven and being with my nephew TJ. I'm always like, when he was dying, I said, "Go find my grandmothers. I was like, just thinking, man, there's so many people waiting on these babies to meet them.

Lisa:

When you have a death in a family, of course it's tragic, but the veil between earth and heaven thins. You start to realize, actually, that's our real home. Actually, that's who I really am. Who I am here is not really who I am. I'm more alive there one day than I'll ever be. I know there's a Hillsong song where it says *as we walk from here into eternity*. And I feel like there's those that have walked ahead of us. That's how I see my parents. That's how I see John's parents. That's also really weird thing.

John and I are now the matriarch-patriarch. There's no parent for us to pick up the phone. There's nobody for us to ask questions. Life becomes so punctuated with urgency and also with the preciousness of moments.

Annie:

I'm even thinking about that as your new book, *The Fight for Female*. One of the things I noticed when I was reading it is it feels like you feel urgent. It feels like you're like, hey, we have a thing to talk about. I see that with you. I see that with Beth Moore. I see that with Lisa Harper, Christine Caine. There are some of y'all that are really stepping into... Rita Springer is another great example, Stasi Eldredge, that y'all are kind of stepping into like, I am here to mother now. Y'all need to listen. We are the matriarchs and we know some things.

Lisa:

Yeah, no. When I wrote *The Fight for Female*, I started to see a problem and I started to think, wait a minute, what's going on here? Why do we have a generation of not just daughters, but sons at risk? When I first started writing the book, I found myself angry, but as I finished it, I found myself heartbroken.

As life would happen, Annie, only you could understand this, I turned in the entire manuscript and it disappeared. I had to start over with all of my edits. 70 hours of edits, all disappeared. I worked my way back from the end of the book, which to me was a rescue and a due back to a dream.

I'm going to tell you soon, Annie. I've never experienced this. As soon as I said I was going to write this book, I had a horrible bike accident. That sounds like a big

baby thing, but broke my ribs, got a concussion, broke my toes, lost all the hands, skins of face, couldn't concentrate. Had a woman who was insisting that I was actually her husband, reaching out to my children, accusing. We're just talking about crazy, demonic, weird, losing a manuscript.

There comes a place where the attacks actually punctuate that you're doing something right, not something wrong. But it helped me do a reset. Because right now, we have a culture that's really good at saying what is wrong, but not pointing them to the one who makes everything right.

We can go to conservative news and we'll hear everything that's wrong, we can go to progressive news and we'll hear everything that's wrong with the other side, but we are not finding a lot of voice in the middle that's willing to be shot at from both sides. I do think that's what mothers are willing to do for the sake of their children.

I had a moment where I was at a church in San Antonio, Texas. I'd done a women's meeting and the matriarch of the church pulls me aside and she said, "Lisa, did you ever know Derek Prince?" I said, "I knew of him. No, I didn't know him." She said, "Well, we hosted him for a women's event and we drove him back to the hotel. My husband and I turned to say goodnight to him and he was weeping."

**Annie:** In the car?

Lisa:

"We were like, 'Hey, what's wrong?' He said, 'I see an attack coming against the women. If the enemy can get the women, he'll get the children." When I say women, I don't just mean mothers. I mean, women, whether you are single, whether you are married, whether you are young, whether you're old. There is something woven inside of women.

Last night, my daughter-in-law, Juliana and Sophie came over here and I asked them, I said, "When you think of female, when you think of women, what are the things?" Of course, it's not unique to women, but it's not like women can only be nurturing.

Annie: Sure.

Lisa:

"But what is that thing that you think of?" We just talked about wisdom, softening, the softening of the hard things in life, adding color to a world that feels very black and white, finding beauty when we see nothing but ugly, finding kindness and wisdom. You and I know that women can be the relational connections where... this was years ago, years ago, I want to say probably 15 years ago, my husband and another minister got in this power struggle about something and they both were like, "No, we're not moving." I remember thinking, "This is not going to go well." I

called the wife and I said, "Hey, let's talk this through." I wrote a letter to both sides and I said, "Listen, we need both of you and we need both of you to reconcile and understand one another and respect one another's strengths."

I think women have that ability. We see it throughout the Bible there's women of wisdom and strategy. I think sometimes we have gone to the lesser where we think our wisdom and our strategy is found in acting like men, where there is an intuition, which intuition is from the Latin word [intuor?]. There's an intuition woven into women where something, we can hear something that sounds right, but feels off. We need to listen to that.

Annie, when I was writing this book, I'd had a dream where I saw women being confused and partnering with lies. The way I described it was actually partnering with the dragon, thinking that the enemy is a friend and he's a wise counselor. There was such a moment when I read in the book of Revelation 12:17, where it says, "And then the dragon was enraged with the woman."

You and I have talked, there seems to be this constant undercurrent. Yes, he hates men too, but he was enraged with the woman and went to make war against her children or offspring. It says those who keep the commandments of God and hold to the testimony of Jesus. There's been a lot of talk about that being Israel, but Israel right now does not hold to the testimony of Jesus.

At the end of the day, the enemy is after the woman because the woman has this ability to fight with the serpent in a way that the man doesn't. That's that enmity, that's the ability to see things, hear things. Unless we shut it down, we fight with life, but we also fight for life.

Being pregnant doesn't make you a warrior, but wanting to see something more for the next generation does. So I believe this next generation of alphas and millennials and Gen Zs, as much as the enemy has whispered that they're victims, I believe we as women need to explain to them, You're not a victim; you're a threat.

**Annie:** 

I'm so interested in this because, well, (a) I'm a woman. I have been very thoughtful recently listening to some of my girlfriends talking, especially because I'm in my 40s. I'm middle-aged. So I'm hearing a lot of women younger than me tell me things. I've lived as an adult for 20 plus years now. It does feel like there's some really specific attacks on women from the enemy. It feels like he really does not like us in some really unique ways.

Lisa:

I love that you're putting it "It's from the enemy." It's not from white patriarchy. It's not from black patriarchy. It's not from Republicans. It is from the enemy. I found

that everything, everything that is coming against women right now is a demonic attack against the revelation of who we really are. It was so crazy.

Again, we see, and you've probably seen this, we see in the book of Genesis, we see the book of beginnings, we see that God is the one who actually told Adam, "Name everything." Do you see something that is like you, but not like you? He's like, I don't have any help me. I don't have any other that can stand toe to toe and voice to voice. I don't have that. God was like, Okay, I'm going to awaken a longing. Then He opens up Adam's side and God is the one who said "it's not good for man to be alone". He never said man wasn't good.

The creation of woman wasn't an afterthought. It was a necessity. We don't know how long they lived in harmony with God. Then we see this enemy come in and be like, I can't have this. I can't have male and female, both in their positions of strength, both empowered into the image of God. I can't have that. I'm going to come in and I'm going to question the goodness of God. I'm going to undermine what God has said. Of course, we all know the fall.

It's interesting that God sets something called enmity, which is irreconcilable hostility between the woman and the serpent. Annie, I travel and ask women. Again, I don't know if I'm intimidating. I don't know if I'm confusing. I don't know what's going on. But I say to the women, When God put enmity between the woman and the serpent, whose side did God put the woman on? They just look at me.

And I say, Okay, let's be clear. Serpent, bad. God is good. I said, there's only two sides. And I said, God actually put the woman... He said, enmity between the woman and the serpent and your seed, which we know is Jesus, and his seed. When God put the woman at odds with the serpent, He put the woman on His side, which it goes into the book of... the New Testament, we find God overshadowing Mary by the Holy Spirit and bringing forth the seed independent of a man.

We also see through one man's transgression and through one man's obedience. And yet we have religion saying women are a problem to be controlled. Rather than what God says about women, that we're an answer to be embraced. We've got this struggle going on with the church silencing the voice of its daughters and the culture sexualizing what it means to be a woman.

This silenced and sexualized is this tension. And it comes with eating disorders. It comes with misogyny. It comes with sex trafficking. It comes with unhealthy patriarchy because there is healthy patriarchy. Unhealthy matriarchy because there is healthy. It comes with the division of family, the wrestling between allies instead of the uniting.

You and I both have men who are friends in our lives. And I have found, and maybe you found this to be different, I have found my male friendships to be less complicated than my female ones.

**Annie:** Yes. That is true.

**Lisa:** I wish that wasn't the case.

**Annie:** For single people, it's until someone catches feelings, then it gets a little more complicated between the guy and the girl. But the day to day it is easier to be friends with dudes.

Lisa: Yes. I have four sons and a husband and so, you know, I tend to be very direct because if I hint, my guys are all like, "What are you saying? Like, just say it. And so I was like, I have low emotional intelligence. Just tell me what you're saying.

But I've learned with women, you almost have to nuance and the confusion and the lack of clarity. We need to understand that all of this chaos, all of this confusion, it's not the men being a problem, nor is it even the women being a problem. It's a dragon who is saying, Oh my gosh, women becoming everything they're created to be, that's a problem to him. And so he's trying to minimize, or he tries to tell us, Annie, if you want to be powerful as a woman, you need to act like a man.

Annie: Right. Right. That's where I struggle so much, Lisa, is I'm like a warrior of a human. I lean on the too much versus the not enough side. If I'm going to get accused of something, it's going to be the "too much" side.

Lisa: Thank you.

Annie: And so can you teach me, how do we on a day to day basis live fully in our divine feminine, live fully in the strength of that without stepping into a role that is not mine?

**Lisa:** I love that you're saying "fully" because your "fully" can look different than my "fully".

**Annie:** Yes. That's good.

Lisa: I mean, obviously I'm married and a mother and a grandmother, but that doesn't mean I'm living my femininity any more fully than you are. And so we can be fully feminine in whatever season that we are in. And yet I feel like what's happened is

there's been a distortion of what it means to be female and present in the image of God.

So I don't believe women have any less of a voice or any less of value. I know that there's a lot of contention about whether women can preach or not. I believe that women can preach. I believe women do preach whether they're ever in a pulpit or not. I do believe that women should have voice. I believe that God is the one that wove creation to respond to both the sound of the voice of the man and the voice of the woman.

Annie: Wow.

Lisa: You know, this is kind of silly, but it illustrates it well. My boys, of course, all boys when they were little, we bought Legos. And I still have them. I mean, I have piles of Legos upstairs all because I want to be the favorite grandmother. But my boys, when they built with their Legos. They built big. They built towers. They had cars. They drove everything around fast. Airplane. It was all about building big.

And then John would come home and he would look at the big and he would be like, "Wow, I really like the height on this. I really like what you've done down here." And then it was a big crash. It was like, watch. And they'd take a car and they would crash something in it. They didn't even necessarily put people in cars.

But one time, and it was only one time I was allowed to babysit my friend's daughter and I watched how she played. Now she was probably three. I watched how she played. When my boys are building big, she's building safe. She's actually using people. She's putting people down for naps. She's got people holding hands. People are driving the cars.

My boys are watching while she's playing with the girl doll and the boy doll. And she has new set. She had some kind of power. My boys are like, wait, what's going on here? She made him kiss. And my boys are like, Now we have to burn that.

I mean, so when women are involved, we build different. And when we only have men, and again, I feel like this has happened in the church. We have a lot of crashing right now where they've built big, but they didn't build safe. And if you don't involve women, you're going to just build big and then it's a big crash. But if you only involve women, you're going to build safe, but you're not going to take territory. So we need both male and female. We need both.

Again, I watch it with my grandkids. It's woven into them. Even my boys, again, my baby's saying, you know, two high chairs. One of my sons is like smashing the peas and eating them off the back of his hand while she's picking it up with her

fingers and eating it and looking at them like, you guys are animals. And they're looking at her like, you're inefficient. So there's a place for both.

And I feel like what we've done is say to women, if you want to have value, you act like a man. And then we've said to the men, and this is where it gets controversial, we've said to the men, we don't value your masculinity. We want you to act like women. So we've got women act like men, magic acting like women, and we've moved both genders away from their position of strength.

So right now, if I'm a single woman, or I'm a stay home mother, or if I'm a woman out there in the corporate world, what I would want you to do is say, God, what does that entrustment a female look like? Because we need the voice of women right now. We need them in every area of life. We need them in the church. We need them in government. We need them... but we need women who love men and love women, you know, that value, the image of God and all of its expressions.

Annie:

I got an Instagram comment the other day, which we can't live and die off of, but as you know... and it was from a woman. And she said, "By going to college and pursuing a career, you have really thrown away your chance to get married and have children." She said, it's so sad to me to see you doing that because you'd have been a great mother. I wish I could tell you that I just laughed it off. I clearly have not laughed it off because remember it.

Talk to us for just a minute. My growing up belief system, whether I was caught or taught, was when you get married and you have kids, that is the path for a Christian woman. I didn't necessarily have another choice because I graduated college and hadn't gotten married and had to get a job. This isn't the 1800s where I can move back in with my parents and wait for some guy to show up at the door.

Lisa: That's because you're not Italian.

Annie: That is true. If I was Italian, it would have been different. Talk to us a little bit

about the cultural belief of the womanhood of that.

First of all, there's no guarantee that every woman is going to get married. And that is not the pinnacle of success as a woman. How many women have gotten married and they thought, Oh, this will fulfill every whatever in my life, every longing, only to find out that marriage comes with its own set of problems.

It's interesting to me that even experts have proven that single women and married women die at the same age. But married men live 10 years longer than single men. When God said it's not good for a man to be alone, I don't think he said it's not good for a woman to be alone. I think he was like, You guys, you'll do fine, but the guys, they're going to need you.

The pinnacle of my life is not a role as wife or even mother, but my pinnacle of my life is not what I do, it's what I leave behind. I know that people can say, well, children, well, gosh, sometimes that's not a good... I mean, you have a child and that child makes choices that break your heart. I hate that that has been the Christian messaging.

I can think of some of the most powerful women. Mother Teresa, never married. I was just reading her speech the other night and she's... Queen Elizabeth never married. There's a benefit of completely focused when Paul said, if you're going to get married, you're going to have to consider the other person and everything. But if

Lisa:

you are singularly focused on Christ, then you don't have to... I mean, you're not going to constantly be pulled.

And I get it that there's a lot of women out there that want to get married, that may get married in a season or may not. And you cannot postpone your life. Here's the thing. God is the one who imparts dignity and value and identity. And my identity is daughter of the most high. It is not wife of John Bevere. It is not mother of four sons. Those are roles. It is not Christian author. Those are all roles.

Anything that you can lose, anything that can be taken away or can be yours in one season or not in the next has absolutely nothing to do with your relationship with the living God. And I think too many people assign value to things that change over the course of time.

I do not believe that I would be who I am without my husband, because I kind of feel like I need a 24-7 finger on my heart. John will say, "Hey babe, what'd you think about 1 Peter today?" And I'll be like, "Oh yeah, I haven't read yet. I'll get back with you on that."

John is highly disciplined and I'm kind of like today's I'm thinking. And it could be 1:30 and I'm still in my pajamas if I wasn't married to John... But I had to... I feel like I needed the refining of marriage. Marriage is the hardest thing I've ever done. Being a mother is the hardest thing I've done. And let's talk about that. Neither of those are necessarily rewarded in our culture. I mean, you hear people say, I'm just a mother.

**Annie:** I'm just a mom. I'm just a stay at home mom. I'm just a mom.

Lisa:

Or I'm just single. Again, when you're single, you can be single minded and there's things that, you know, I would do if I was single that I can't do married. Again, I'm not saying don't dream. I'm not saying don't hope. But gosh, don't postpone living. Don't look a decade back and say, why didn't I do that? Why was I waiting for permission to live fully.

And femininity, again, it can be expressed in motherhood, but it can just be expressed in wisdom and kindness and relational equity. I mean, come on, Annie, thank you that you didn't say, well, I can't do a podcast. I don't have a covering. My husband's not covering me. I don't have permission. You said, I see. I see a need and I'm going to use my voice. And I know. I mean, I get it. So if I get it, you're going to get it. I know you're going to get pushed back, you know, because podcasts can be a pulpit because you're speaking, you're speaking with authority or you're speaking, you know...

At the end of the day, we stand before God and I can't say, and you can't say, well, somebody didn't like it, so I didn't do it. Right. It's going to be between us and God.

Annie:

Right. Our mutual friend, Bianca Olthoff often says when she's talking about being a woman preacher, she says, "When I get to heaven, if God says that was wrong, I want to say, but aren't you glad I tried so hard. Aren't you glad I went for it?"

Lisa:

I would rather make a mistake in faith than make one in fear.

Annie:

And waiting.

Lisa:

Because that's called burying your talent. And saying, I know you're a hard task master. Here's the one talent you gave me. I mean, at least we're trying to multiply it. At the end of the day, it's either the fear of the Lord or the fear of man. And the fear of man is a snare, which means you will... if you think about it, if you've got your foot trapped in a bear trap, you're just going to circle, you're going to live in a pattern of today is like yesterday, yesterday was like 10 years ago, 10 years ago was like 20. I'm just trapped. God's not faithful to me. Well, you know what, you have been entrapped by the fear of man, by the opinions of others, by an inability to risk.

Annie, I feel like there was two things released during the pandemic. One of course was the COVID virus, but I also feel like there was an outbreak of cowardice. And I feel like people shut themselves down, they lost their voice, they were afraid if they said this, it was too much or this, it was too little. And so they started to self-censor and self-censoring. When you lose your voice, you lose your first line of defense.

If I was attacked in a parking lot, the person would say to me, "Don't scream, which means scream." So right now I feel like there's so many women out there. And this is actually why I wrote the book. I felt like women were like, I know something is wrong, but I don't know how to say it. And I don't know why I should say it. And I don't know if I'm educated enough to say it.

And this is the first time I've ever written a book where I said, I'm going to teach Christian women how to interact with culture. Because it's always been, we're in our church world and we're talking about being nice to each other and empowering each other and finding our voice. But this was for the love of Jesus, a generation of children are lost on the internet highways and byways, and they're being told their formation is at stake.

Annie:

Discipled by the internet. Right. Right.

Lisa:

Exactly. And we're like, oh, I don't want to say something. Well, you have to. You have to. But how you say it is just as important as what you say. When I sign books, I always try to write a dedication on the front of it because I believe how you read a book, the tone is just as important as what you read. So I said, beautiful daughter, though female was created last, she is not least. You began in God's image and will reborn his daughter. Because we're all made in the image of God, but only when we're born again, do we get our Father's nature. Yet I fear your divine identity and its authority in your life is under assault. An ancient foe, not being single. An ancient foe, not whatever, not because you went to college. An ancient foe hopes to strip you of this designation. Don't let him. Each day. Each day.

And this is so important to me. See, I believe that we can go to bed a coward and wake up courageous.

Annie:

Oh, say more.

Lisa:

Okay. All right. Big fan of Riley Gaines. What did she do? They're like, you got to do this. You got to take second. You don't get to get the trophy. And you see her face in that photo and she's complicit. But then something happened and I don't know what happened. But then something happened.

And she said that she was told, if you say anything, you'll never get a job. You'll never get a scholarship. You'll never get this. You'll never get. So she allowed them to shrink her. But all of us have an intolerance point where we say, Okay, you know what? That just pushed me a little bit too far. I don't know what her intolerance point was. But she obviously one day said, You know what? I don't care. I don't care if I don't get... it's not right. And so she started to use her voice. They'd taken her voice and she took it back. And so each day is an opportunity for us to begin again.

And I feel like the other thing is we don't understand the power of a dream. We have found ourselves in a nightmare and the power of a dream moves us from a nightmare into a dream. And you and I had talked earlier about fasting. So many people are like, I can't hear from God. I can't hear from God. Well, you know what? Every time I have felt like this, "I feel like it's God saying, come on, Lisa. Put down your phone. Put aside this and pursue that. Don't fulfill yourself with things that will satiate your physical appetite. I want you to stir up a spiritual appetite.

You know, Annie in America, we are a land of abundance of distractions. And when you have an abundance of distractions, you have to intentionally shrink your world to a place of focus. I don't know if you saw this in the book. It's such a random bizarre thing. But when John and I were 24 and 25, we went out with this

minister who was always talking about casting out demons. So I was scared of him. I thought he has asked us out to breakfast because he thinks I have a demon.

I mean, I made John pray over me. I was like, "If I have any demons, let's just deal with it now. I don't want that at breakfast." So we go out with him and he tells us, he said, "I see the hand of God on the two of you." At the time I was working for Eli Lilly. I was not working at a church. I was a cosmetic rep. I had turquoise eyeshadow and blonde hair. There was a lot of things that this is a very mixed signaling for you.

But he said all these different things to us. But one of the things he said to us that was astounding is he said, "I see a day coming where people's lives will be controlled by a box they hold in their hands." I know. 1984. And John and I thought, "Box? Like boxes?" But he was talking about this. He saw we were confused and he was like, "No, they're going to be like, my box is telling me to say this and do this and be this." And we're like, don't think that's happening. Like we think he's seen out, but here we go. And in 2020, John, I looked at each other and we said, Oh, wow.

But here's the beautiful thing. He said, "After all of this, there's going to be a revival." And I feel like people like right now, they've listened to the box and the box has made promises. If you just are thinner, if you just are more well-connected, if you have more likes on your Instagram, if you have this, if you're married, if you get divorced... I mean, it's all these... if so and so, if... and it's a portable idol that we have bowed our head towards that we have said, Okay, I'm going to live in a world I can hold in my hand instead of surrendering to the one who holds the world in his hands.

When we say enough, we go to bed in idolatry and we put it down and we wake up free, free to worship the living God. So fasting, social media is probably one of the most powerful things. I mean, food is also very important. Again, my life was reframed by a fast. Before I married John, God said... I had taken all my excessive drinking, and I said, Oh, now that I'm a Christian, I'm not going to drink, but I can eat at every opportunity. And prairie skirts were godly. And so now I could be in a prairie skirt and look godly. And I outgrew my wedding gown and I remember getting mad at God. Like He had force-fed me the Domino's pizza that I ate all by myself and the chocolate chip cookie dough that I microwaved.

And he said, your weight and food is an idol to you. It's what you draw your strength from. And it's what you give your strength to. If you are thin, you feel like you're worthy of love. If you are thin, you feel like you're in control of your life. And he said, Lisa, I want you to fast. And I thought, "Wait, wait, you just told me

not to diet. Now you're telling me to fast." And he said, a diet changes the way you look, but a fast changes the way you see.

And we have a generation that needs eyes to see what God is doing, that there is a dragon in the shadows. That we need to look past the people. I mean, even when we look at Ephesians, we wrestle not with flesh and blood, but with principalities and powers. So if I can see them, if they have a name, they're not my problem.

**Annie:** That's right. If I can reach out and touch them, they are actually not the enemy.

That's a great point, Lisa.

**Lisa:** They might be pushed by the enemy. But see, I've been pushed by the enemy. So I

can have compassion on captives, right?

**Annie:** Someone can tell that story about me on the other side. That's exactly right. Right.

**Lisa:** Exactly. Exactly.

Annie:

I feel like I blow this trumpet all the time because I feel like if there's any spiritual discipline that the enemy has tried to steal specifically from women, it feels like fasting. There was a time where I was looking for a book on 40 days, on fasting for 40 days, and I was asking around and it was all dudes, all dudes in my life. Anecdotally, it was only men who had done it. And then when I was looking for resources, they were only for men. And I was like, Hold on, there's something we're missing here.

So will you talk a little bit about what is the uniqueness of women in spiritual power, like in our warfare prayer? I mean, I know that dudes intercede, but what I hear yelling in prayer rooms is women. And so you talk a little bit about that.

Lisa:

Absolutely. And there's something that a woman can do that a man really can't do. And that's wail.

Annie:

Wow.

Lisa:

I remember the first time, and I hope this isn't offensive to you, but the first time I saw the documentary, The Silent Scream. Now, it was showing a...

Annie:

I have not seen it. It was a window into a womb. It was a sonogram during an abortion. And they showed the baby running from the...

Annie:

Oh gosh.

Lisa:

...the instrument that was getting ready to cut it up. And the baby is screaming in utero, that preborn baby is screaming. And the mother when they actually breached the cervix, the mother yelled. And I watched all this and Annie, something inside of me, I just started to wail. And I was like, who's making that sound? Oh, I'm making that sound. It's when the natural and the spirit intersect.

And women know how to carry things in the spirit differently than men carry things in the spirit. It's not an accident that God told the woman at the well that Jesus was

like, I'm the Messiah. And what does she do? She dropped all of it. And she ran into the city and she said, "Okay, listen, come meet a man who told me everything about myself. What I think people don't understand about her, it wasn't that she had divorced five husbands. It's that she had been rejected over and over and over again, but she was a deep well living a shallow life.

And I feel like so many women right now, they're deep wells living shallow lives, whether that life is success as people measure it. I mean, at the end of the day, my highest calling is to know Him and to be transformed into his image. To every single day, live in a way where I am denying myself, taking my cross and following Him. That's just Christianity 101.

And then we think, well, how do we do that? Well, He's our pattern. Everywhere Jesus went He brought good news. Everywhere He went He set the captives free. He didn't say you're captive. He set the captives free. He didn't just stop with that.

I've gotten a lot of pushback on this, but I feel like I can say this on your podcast. There's some conversations that we need to understand that we need to be able to say. I'd had a conversation with a beautiful, influential woman. And she said, If you and I are sitting here and Jesus is sitting here with us and my friend who believes she's born in the wrong body was sitting, what would he say to her? And I remember it was like 6:30 in the morning and I wanted to say, he would say, get coffee, get coffee.

I was like, what are we doing talking about this so early? And I had to go, Holy spirit, Holy spirit, what do I say? And I heard, first, he would say, I love you. Because the love of God is never in question. There is no darkness, there is no mud, there is no mire, there is no sin that can separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus. We know that.

So first he would say "I love you". Then He would say "you're not a mistake". All right? But third, he would say, and this is where people get mad at me. He would say "I understand". And people are like, how could He understand? Was Jesus transgender? No, but He was a high priest. Hebrews 4 tells us that is touched with our struggles.

And then Philippians 2 tells us that Jesus, who did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but He took on the nature of a servant. That He emptied himself of His divine identity and set aside his divine form. And He became us so we could become Him.

So of course we're uncomfortable in our bodies. I mean, you're in your 40s. I'm in my 60s. Oh my gosh. Annie, every single day is an adventure. I'm like, what in the world?

Annie: This is not the body I knew. This is not the body I knew 20 years ago.

> Yesterday I did not have that brown spot. What happened? Like what just happened? So what's happening outwardly I'm perishing, but inwardly I am longing for eternity. So we all know we're created for more, but it's not more husbands, it's not more stuff, it's not more, whatever accolades of people. It is an eternal more.

And so we're going to have a whole generation of LGTBO people that have been promised wholeness and women who heard that if they got married, whatever, they've been promised wholeness outside of Christ. They're going to run to Christ. And we need to be ready to understand that He loves and that He sees the uncomfortable. Because how uncomfortable would it be to be Jesus having been the Son of God to put on our human flesh?

Annie: And so for 33 years, that is a long time. That is a long time.

> I understand that He gets us, but He actually became us so we could put on Christ. I don't think we understand that exchange and how profound it was. And when we actually try to grasp at equality with God and say, I'm going to put on the costume of woman if I'm a man, or of man if I'm a woman and God is like, I get the frailties and the challenges, I get the struggle, but let me just tell you that you're longing for more is Me.

That is true of my life too.

Lisa: Fasting redirects that. Doesn't it?

> Yeah. Yeah. I mean, it's what you said, that it helps us to see and to see clearly. I'm trying to think about our friends as they're hearing this and they're like, okay, my next thing, here's my next thing to do. So reading the book, reading *The Fight for* Female will help.

But will you also put some words around like... describe divine femininity so we can start talking with our co...My counselor and I are having this conversation. I'm telling you, this is what we are talking about. We are talking about: what does it look like to be a strong feminine woman of God? Like how do I hold all that at the same time? So give us some language around what is divine femininity? What is that? Because I also think sometimes that language is used by new age-

Lisa: Goddesses.

Annie: ...outside of the faith, but it's actually a really beautiful, true thing for us as

believers.

**Lisa:** Well, I believe it's divine identity because it was divinely given. It wasn't

happenstance. It wasn't like, "Oh wait, I meant to make her a boy. Oh, by accident, I made her a girl." It's divinely entrusted, but I love that it's a spectrum. So I love that femininity can be a tomboy and femininity can be frilly, girly pink. I'm not that. I'll

never be that.

And it's sad that to me right now, if I was born in junior high and they would have come to me and said, Well, you're probably a boy, you probably were the wrong body. But see, God was like, nope, she's going to have four sons and her husband's going to play tennis, but she's going to hunt and ski and surf. So we need somebody that's on the other side of this to balance out that.

And so it's a spectrum. You can be feminine and a warrior. We see that in jail. We see that in Debra and we see that in Mary, a young girl saying, Be it unto me according to your word. We see it in Elizabeth. We see it in an older woman. We see femininity as whoever we are. We have this ability, whether we're White or Black or tall or thin or whatever it is, we can express femininity in our season as a woman.

Here's the thing. When God said in Ephesians... and I love how the message says God is strong and He wants you strong.

**Annie:** Yes, I love that too.

**Lisa:** Strong is not wrong.

**Annie:** That's right.

**Lisa:** People need to know that "strong" is not wrong. It's not wrong for women to be strong. And wrong isn't strong. Being angry and mean... you know, we know that the wrath of man never works the righteous purposes of God. That also goes for women. So you can be strong without being physical. You can be strong in the

spirit.

Again, that is what the enemy is so afraid of, that we carry life in the spirit, we carry life, we open our mouth with wisdom and kindness. Listen, sometimes I open my mouth with things that are very different than wisdom and kindness, but God's

like, let's open it with that. And that we actually... I mean, it says she considers the fields and buys it. It doesn't say she asked her husband permission.

So I think God's like, do you have a brain? So femininity has a brain. Femininity can be entrepreneurial. Femininity can flourish in wherever they are, whatever season they are in. I'm not any less feminine because I've been through menopause. Because I can't reproduce, that doesn't make me less feminine. But I also think that it's not a costume. I think we've gone to the lesser instead of the more femininity is not seduction. Femininity is beauty. Femininity is intimacy. It is not lust. Femininity is the embrace. It is not the demeaning of either male or female.

So we have to take back the protection of our daughters. I think it's feminine to play in sports. I just think it's wrong for men to be in women's sports, you know? So I think that we have this freedom of range of movement and opportunity that we have as a God gift. There's nothing that says, you know, that you can't podcast because you're a woman, right? There's nothing that says I can't preach.

Matter of fact, when I was reading the book of Acts, it talks about how Peter and John, how they were taken captive. They were like, Hey, we forbid you to preach and teach in the name of Jesus. And it said, you know, they called him back. And when I read that, I had such a sense that the Holy spirit was saying, there's a generation of my daughters who I've commissioned to go and preach in my name. And religious leaders have called them back and forbidden them. And he said, they've got to say to these religious leaders, what Peter and John said, do we obey God or do we obey you? At the end of the day, that's it. That's it.

**Annie:** It's such a gift-

**Lisa:** I don't know if I completely answered your question.

Annie: Listen, well, here's the thing. Yes you did. And this is the start of a conversation we all need to be having with our counselors and with our mentors and with our friends and with our mothers and with our sisters-

**Lisa:** And with our neighbors.

**Annie:** Yeah, that's good.

Lisa:

I want to close with this. We can read, we can fast, we can pray. But I had this conversation with this brilliant man who is an expert in totalitarianism. He's Belgian and he is a statistician. And he was talking about what was going on in his nation. He was talking about how we are on the precipice of the cliff of falling into totalitarianism. I'm like sitting there, I've got a pregnant daughter all next to me, I'm

like, "For the love of Jesus, what do we do?" And he said, "Well, violence and protests justify totalitarianism." And I said, "Okay, what do we do?" And you know what he said? He said, "Constant, courageous, clear conversations."

**Annie:** Wow. Constant, courageous, clear conversations.

So even what we're doing right now. And then after I hung up with him... and he didn't get to write this in the book, but I was hoping that that is what the book would spark. After I hung up with him, I thought, how did the church grow in the Book of Acts? They went from house to house, and they talked to one another about the teaching of the apostles.

See, what happened during COVID is we lost the ability to have conversations. We are sitting on the toilet arguing with strangers instead of engaging with people, hearing what they're saying and giving them a chance to hear what we have to say.

Annie: That's really good. Constant, courageous, clear conversation. That is what we get to do. Lisa, thank you for making time to do this. I'm so grateful.
